When looking back upon the previous year, one tends to focus on those things still to be accomplished rather than all that has been achieved. This is why it seemed so important to take a few minutes to inventory all of the things that we have accomplished together in 2010. In no particular order:

- Added landscaping, historic lighting, rain gardens, and paver circle with space for future artwork at Alabama Street
- Planted 400 juniper bushes and 50 trees along the Morris/Prospect Corridor (The Triangle Gateway)
- Designed and implemented a new Bates-Hendricks website, bateshendricks.org
- Started a Facebook page
- Successfully petitioned for relocation of the Marion County Parole Office from Minnesota Street
- Built and entered a float in the Fountain Square Art Parade
- Obtained and implemented a grant to survey the abandoned housing in the entire Southeast (SEND) area
- Designed, commissioned, and installed seven identity banners around the neighborhood
- Worked with Paint the Town to help prep and repaint three homes in Bates-Hendricks
- Worked with several landlords along East Street to construct picket fences (some replacing existing chain-link fences)
- Continued work with SEND on the abandoned housing initiative (Dirty Thirty)

- Participated in the successful implementation of a Neighborhood Congress
- Formed Orange Street Block Club through the Study Circle Grant program
- New Street Block Club cleanup (including five blocks and five alleys filling five 40yard dumpsters)
- New Street Block Party
- Wright Street Block Club cleanup
- Terrace Avenue cleanup through the Study Circle Grant program
- Quad 1 cleanup
- Vigilante cleanup at abandoned Sanders Street property
- Vigilante cleanup at abandoned Orange Street property
- Professional landscaping of four planting beds along Pleasant Run Parkway
- Successful integration of automated garbage pickup
- Received third place in the nation for the New Jersey Street beautification project from Neighborhoods USA at the Best Neighborhood in the Nation Awards



Wow! I hope that all of you read through this list with the same swelling of pride that I have felt in compiling it. Still, I feel that something is missing. ### **East Street Entryway Project Planned for 2011**

It wasn't too long ago that many of the residents of Bates-Hendricks didn't even know the name of our neighborhood. There wasn't a sense of pride about living on the near South Side. Several years ago, neighborhood leaders recognized this dynamic as an obstacle to neighborhood vitality and began planning ways to create a proud identity for our neighborhood.

Several actions were taken. A neighborhood newsletter was created. The neighborhood was registered with the city. A brochure promoting the neighborhood was developed. Projects and events were designed to promote our neighborhood. In 2010, seven identity banners – a long dreamed-of goal – were installed at key entry points.

In 2011, neighborhood leaders are planning to tackle one of the most ambitious dreams – an East Street entryway. The idea is to create a median at the corner of East and Morris with greenery and signage that announces to everyone that they are entering Bates-Hendricks. The area between Morris and Sanders, where four lanes choke down to two lanes affords an excellent location for such a median. The preliminary pictures below offer a rough idea of the concept. In 2011, BHNA will be working with the Lilly Foundation and the city to raise the funding for this ambitious plan.







## **Read-In At City County Building**

On January 24 at 7:00pm the Sustainable Library Citizens Coalition will hold a read-in at the City County Building. Marion County residents and library supporters are encouraged to bring a good book to the City County Building and read for an hour. This quiet demonstration will occur during the scheduled meeting of the City County Council. The group hopes to fill the building.



As many of us know, last spring the Public Library announced plans to close our local branch in Fountain Square. Over a hundred Southeast residents were active in the efforts to "save the library". In August, the Library Board decided to cut services at all branches by 25% rather than close any single branch. While this was good news for the many who use the Fountain Square branch, this was not a permanent solution. Without additional funding sources, the Library Board has warned further cuts will be made this spring.

The Sustainable Library Citizens Coalition is an organization created out of this grassroots movement and is well represented by individuals from our neighborhood. They now have a Facebook page and a website at *myindylibrary.org*. Their goal is to pressure city officials and politicians to find a sustainable funding source for library services.
