## Leaf Season Has Arrived

Leaf pickup will start on Monday, October 24 and go through Friday, December 2. All leaves need to be bagged for pickup. Kraft paper bags are acceptable, but not recommended. Residents may set out up to 40 bags of leaves per week in addition to regular trash. The bagged leaves should not be set directly in contact with the 96-gallon cart but kept three to five feet away (or else the cart may not be able to be emptied). The leaves will be picked up separately from regular trash. The leaves that are collected are taken to Southside Landfill where they are turned into compost. When ready, the compost is made available to Indianapolis residents at no charge. Call 247-6808 for availability.

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# **Community Gardens are in the Works**

Two community gardens are in progress in the Bates-Hendricks and Fountain Square areas. One is the School 31 winter garden on the corner of Alabama and Lincoln. This garden was recently planted with plants and flowers that are frost-hardy, including pansies, red cabbage, various kinds of lettuce, and swiss chard. Parents have worked leaves in among the plants to keep weeds down, attract worms, and build the soil. Depending on the severity of the winter and the amount of surrounding mulch, these plants could survive the entire winter and be harvested for healthy food. If you want to help with this garden, now is the time to build the soil. Bring bags of leaves to the site and they will be spread by volunteers. The leaves are even more important than mulch because a single one-foot coating of leaves on a garden in the fall can transform even the worst dirt for a spring garden. 
The other garden in the works is the community garden that is just taking form in the vacant lot across the street from 901 Shelby. This week, just the trees will be trimmed, but in the near future, neighbors are being asked to bring bags of leaves to this site as well. This will be a model urban garden planted and maintained by neighbors from all of SEND's southside neighborhoods. The hope is to use it as a teaching model to promote urban gardening throughout the entire southside. > If you are hoping to plant a garden on your own property, line the perimeters of the area you want to be your garden with a two-foot tall fence and fill the fenced area with leaves now. You may have to wet them down to keep them in place. By springtime, the leaves will have transformed the area below them so completely

> > that you will not have to till before planting. The first spring planting time is early March, when you can plant strawberries, potatoes, peas, cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, brussels sprouts, lettuce, radishes, and so much more. All of these can survive the frost, but in order to plant in the spring, you need to prepare now and order your supplies in February.

### **Delectable Dishes**

#### Pumpkin Bread Pudding

Ingredients:

- 8 ounces French bread, torn into small pieces, about 5 cups
- 2 cups half-and-half, or half milk and half cream
- 3 large eggs
- 2/3 cup granulated sugar
- 2/3 cup brown sugar
- 1 can (15 ounces) pumpkin puree
- 3 tablespoons melted butter
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Cinnamon sugar, optional

#### Preparation:

Butter an 11 x 7-inch baking dish. Heat oven to 350°. In a bowl, cover the torn bread with the half-andhalf; set aside. In another bowl, combine eggs, sugars, pumpkin, cranberries, melted butter, spices, and vanilla; blend well. Pour pumpkin mixture over soaked bread and stir to blend. Pour mixture into the prepared baking dish. Sprinkle top with cinnamon-sugar, if desired. Bake for 45 to 60 minutes, or until set.

Serve with a vanilla dessert sauce or brown sugar sauce, whipped cream, or vanilla ice cream. Serves 8.
