



reporting high weeds and grass, hopefully they are at least getting mowed. As you have probably seen, many of the dilapidated homes that are beyond repair are being demolished. Our number one house on the most recent "dirty thirty" list was recently demolished (422 Sanders).

John Winter (BH Vice President) has made it his personal mission to tackle these abandoned houses, one way or another. John is actively and regularly participating in the Southeast Neighborhood Congress' Alternatives to Demolition Task Force meetings that include residents from the greater southeast area. Many houses are being purchased and rehabilitated through the SEND Transfer and Transform program. We are currently trying to track down the owners and banks that are responsible for many of the abandoned properties so that we can hold them accountable.

We are currently gearing up for another abandoned housing survey to check our progress and establish a new "dirty thirty". The abandoned housing survey first initiated in the Bates-Hendricks Neighborhood has become a model for other inner-city neighborhoods to use. I would say that tackling this very difficult issue has been successful so far, but we have a long way to go. We realize this, and we'll not give up until the momentum is moving in the right direction. However, we need everyone's participation. After the next Bates-Hendricks Neighborhood Association meeting on July 2, the BH Abandoned Housing Task Force will meet again to begin preparation for the next survey. Proper Times to Set Off Fireworks

The City of Indianapolis wants to remind everyone that it is only legal to set off fireworks during the following times:

- June 28 through July 3 between 5:00pm and two hours after sunset
- July 4 between 10:00am and 12:00 midnight
- July 5 through July 9 between 5:00pm and two hours after sunset
- December 31 and January 1, between 10:00am on December 31 and 1:00am on January 1

For the first offense in any twelve month period, violators shall be subject to admission of violation and payment of the civil penalty. For the second offense in any twelve month period, the civil penalty is fixed at a minimum of \$500. For the third and subsequent offenses in any twelve month period, a civil penalty of up to \$2,500 shall be imposed.

This does not have anything to do with selling or purchasing of fireworks. For anyone concerned about the sale of fireworks in residential areas, a resident in Fountain Square is working on that issue.
