Second, for the last couple months we have been promoting a huge neighborhood volunteer effort that is coming up on October 13 and 14 called "Good Neighbor Weekend". We have 400 volunteers coming into the neighborhood from Northview Church (*www.northviewchurch.us*) to help with various projects. Northview is providing volunteers, some funds, and some tools and equipment. Our own Immanuel United Church of Christ will also be providing volunteers and their facilities for meeting and eating. Many neighborhood residents are volunteering and leading volunteer groups. Of course, this wouldn't be possible without Keep Indianapolis Beautiful, Inc. (KIB), who is providing several dumpsters that will be staged throughout the neighborhood, mulch, plants, trash bags, gloves, water, and some tools.

Last week, we toured the neighborhood with the volunteer coordinators from Northview, looking at each of the projects we would like to work on to solidify a plan. On both Saturday and Sunday, October 13 and 14, at 8:30am, we will meet in the parking lot at Immanuel United Church of Christ (402 Prospect Street). Around 9:00am, we will send teams out to work on the Morris/Prospect triangle gateway (embankment along Morris and Prospect). A group will go to the community center (former Sassy Kats) to help with remodeling. A group will work on the New Jersey Street Esplanade. We have also coordinated with School 31 to help them build their garden at Lincoln and Alabama Streets. Groups will be dispatched to each of the neighborhood quads to pick up trash, trim vegetation, and clean gutters. Various other small projects will be completed as time and resources allow.

We are grateful to Northview for choosing our neighborhood. The Good Neighbor Weekend is not just about getting a bunch of people to do a bunch of stuff. It's about forming relationships and building bridges as well. If you see people out working on October 13 and 14, make sure to thank them. Lunch will be provided to all neighborhood residents who participate. If you know ahead of time that you will be participating, please let me know for food planning purposes. ### **Creating Landscape Beds: It's Planting Time**

Have you started your new landscape bed spaces yet? It isn't too late. Last month, we talked about alternatives to lawn in the yard (archived newsletters available at *bateshendricks.org/news*). Mulched or stone-covered landscape beds are a great option for reducing mowing maintenance and making your house a home.

Fall is the ideal time of year to start new bed spaces and install new plants. In fact, now is the best time for planting many favorite trees, shrubs, and perennials. With lower watering requirements than spring or summer and less aggressive weed growth, creating new spaces is never easier. It's also the best time of year to plant popular spring flowering bulbs, such as Daffodils, Crocus, and Tulips. Even better, many of these plants will soon go on clearance at retail nurseries, such as Lowe's, at 50-90% off original prices! That's a lot of bang for your buck.

If you followed the tips from last month's article, you've marked out and sprayed RoundUp on your new bed space. The grass/weeds may or may not be fully dead yet because of the cooler temperatures and rainy days we've had lately in the neighborhood. A final spray of anything still green should be effective, and if you're unsure, dig out the toughest weeds. Wait a day or two before planting smaller perennials and bulbs to make sure any excess spray has broken down to a harmless state.

Now you're ready to pick out your plants. I like to select varieties that have multiple flower and color seasons, and whose full size works well in the space. Knockout Roses, Boxwood, Viburnums, and Sweetspire create great background form and color through multiple seasons. Karl Foerster and other ornamental grasses give midsummer and winter interest. Most trees and shrubs can be planted nearly any time of year, except for Flowering Dogwoods, some Oaks, and Roses, which like spring or summer planting. For perennials, Walker's Low Catmint, Liriope, Coreopsis, Shasta Daisy, Russian Sage, and Sedum are excellent accent and border plants. Because we're so far into the urban heat island of downtown Indianapolis, we have an extended planting season for perennials. In most areas of the county, the last weeks to stop planting perennials is the middle or end of October, but ours normally includes the first week of November. But don't try to plant or transplant perennials between the middle of November and the middle of April unless you want to replant next year.

The plants we've talked about so far can be used with the following techniques and tips:

1. Massing: This involves buying or transplanting large numbers of a single plant and grouping them in 3's, 5's, or larger numbers. Especially effective with perennials, massing will make your smaller specimens look like one larger plant. You can create a border using your favorite short perennial to bring a bold unified look to the front of your beds.

2. Layering: A very effective way to place groupings of plants, layering can organize a space by including masses of shorter perennials in front of larger forms. By applying this technique, you can increase the visual space of our sometimes small front yards. Or it can help bring additional color into an area that has a background planting of evergreens.

3. Balance: This is the one that takes the most practice. When you think of balance, the tendency is to go for symmetry – five plants here, five plants there. But really, balance has more to do with form than symmetry. For example, a large tree to the left of the door can be balanced by a denser massing of colorful shrubs to the right of the door. Certain features of your house (offset porch, brightly colored door, etc.) will prove to be like a large tree in that they need to be visually balanced with a similarly eye-grabbing form.


