
Flood of Volunteers in Bates-Hendricks for GNW!

This year's Good Neighbor Weekend (GNW) on November 1 and 2 saw approximately 600 volunteers come into the neighborhood to help out over two days! Thanks to Northview Church, Immanuel Church, and neighborhood volunteers, the following projects were accomplished:



- Planting nearly 10,000 bulbs at various locations!
- Immanuel Church painting Chapel and two bathrooms
- Alabama Street Esplanade and Rain Gardens cleaning and weeding
- New Jersey Esplanade raking leaves on esplanade and sidewalks, weeding, planting bulbs
- School 31 Garden weeding, cleaning, and planting
- Baumann Park weeding, planting flowers and a tree, mulching, and cleaning
- Coburn Park installing new sign, raking leaves, weeding, and planting bulbs
- North Gateway installing plants in side medians
- East Gateway picking up trash, raking leaves, planting bulbs
- Wright Street Path raking leaves, weeding, picking up trash, planting bulbs, mulching

Rediscovering Ringgold Park

Bates-Hendricks is a neighborhood visibly growing greener each spring. You might say we've developed a knack for creating and enhancing inspiring green spaces. In recent years, residents and partners, such as Keep Indianapolis Beautiful, have tackled and improved everything from existing city parks and medians to rugged empty lots. Boldly bearing the title "An Indianapolis Garden District" in the Miracle Mile Parade this year, we've got the parks to prove it: Baumann, Czerny, Hendricks, Orange, as well as School 31 Garden, New Jersey Street Esplanade...to name just a few of our green spaces.

The Bates-Hendricks approach to reshaping earth is far from haphazard. Before undertaking a project, leadership works to ensure changes are sensitive to traces of the past, reflective of current needs, and striving to meet the anticipated desires of the future. That's why when long-time residents' fond recollections of Ringgold Park reached the ears of BHNA leadership, research and reflection on the journey of the park ensued.


Currently located at the corner of Cottage and Ringgold Avenues, the relocated park is a downsized victim of transportation development and a shadow of its former self. Using local history collections of several Indy institutions and the Drawings and Documents Archive at Ball State University's College of Architecture and Planning, here's a chronology of what was discovered:

19XX: park established sometime in the early 20th century.

1915: Ringgold Play Grounds is detailed on the Indianapolis Sanborn Map #144, 1915. A bathing pool is depicted. A playground block (with residential plats to the north and south) is bordered by Cottage, Ringgold, Orange, and presumably Hartford Street.

1916: Baist Atlas Plan depiction of park is consistent with the 1915 Sanborn map. Hartford can be confirmed as fourth border street.

1936: The park is depicted on a March 25, 1936 Indianapolis Parks plan. A 0.9 acre playground (Playground, Ringgold Ave) is bordered by residential plats to the north and south (south

configuration changed). The border streets are Cottage, Ringgold, Orange, and Hartford. Details (swings, volleyball court, etc.) are penciled in on the plan. A bathing pool is no longer depicted.

1956: The park is depicted in the original location on a Sanborn map and MapIndy aerial views.

1968-1971: I-65 interchange construction. It is unknown if the park was relocated during this phase.

1978: Interstate complete, as per MapIndy, and a green space at the park's current location is discernible.


Bates-Hendricks Neighborhood Association
