
# Don't Forget to Bring in Your Trash Cart(s)

# **City Issues Reminder About Maintaining Lots**

The Department of Code Enforcement (DCE) wants to remind citizens that the City's high weeds and grass program will begin once again this season.





Property owners who receive a notice of violation have five days from the date the notice is mailed to mow their overgrown property. If a property owner fails to mow the property, the City will send a mowing vendor to mow the property and will bill the property owner for the service at a rate of at least \$353 per lot.

Residents may report a high weeds and grass violation by calling the Mayor's Action Center (MAC) at 327-4MAC, by logging on to RequestIndy at <a href="https://www.indy.gov/requestindy">www.indy.gov/requestindy</a>, or by using the RequestIndy Mobile Application.
