Snow Removal

According to the Municipal Code of Indianapolis (Sec. 431-106), property owners and occupants are responsible for keeping sidewalks clear of snow and ice, but it's also just a good, neighborly thing to do. Many people rely on walking and transit as their primary way to get around, and without a wide, clear path through snow and ice, it is especially difficult for people with disabilities, seniors, and children to walk safely. We are all pedestrians and benefit from having a safe, clear, and continuous path to travel.

The Code also stipulates when snow should be removed. If the snow stops falling after 7:00pm, you have until 9:00am the next morning to clear the sidewalk. If the snow stops falling after 9:00am, you have until 7:00pm that evening to clear the sidewalk. You should clear a 5-foot-wide path along the sidewalk, where conditions allow.

Individuals and businesses who do not comply with the sidewalk snow removal ordinance can technically face fines of \$50, but in practice that probably won't happen. Violations can be reported to the Mayor's Action Center through RequestIndy or by calling (317) 327-4622, but please consider helping your neighbor with the snow removal instead.

Indy Snow Force's mission is to keep the City's streets passable and safe for driving (note that they won't plow neighborhood streets with less than 6" of snow). As a result of plowing, snow from travel lanes may be thrown in sidewalks and yards. If a property owner has made every effort to clear his or her sidewalk in accordance with the Code, that property owner will be considered in compliance.

Letter from the President

With almost 15 years of living in downtown Indianapolis, I know that urban living isn't always perfect, but I've learned a few simple tricks to make it easier. Broken Window Theory (BWT) and Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) discuss many simple ways that slight changes to our surroundings can have big effects.

BWT is about the way you maintain the environment around you. The thought behind Broken Window Theory is that when broken windows are left in disrepair for a long time, vandals are more likely to break more windows and cause additional property damage. Have you ever noticed when you see one piece of graffiti that it builds upon itself? More and more graffiti will be layered on that, yet on the next building where there

is no graffiti, no one bothers it. It's the same idea. How does this apply to us as neighbors? When you see a house with a broken window (or other damage), let the owner know. If you can't get ahold of the property owner, report it through RequestIndy (maps.indy.gov/RequestIndy or download the app for iOS or Android) or call the Mayors Action Center (327-4622). On a smaller level, when you see trash on the streets, pick it up. Similarly, areas with trash strewn about are more likely to have passersby throw trash on the ground as well.

CPTED goes further by addressing more proactive methods for creating a safer environment. For example, think about lines of sight. If you have tall and overgrown bushes, this leaves plenty of space for people to hide. Similarly, trees can be trimmed-up to provide easy sight lines, allowing you to see what's going on around you. Generally, you want to keep bushes 3 to 4 feet tall and trees no lower than 5 feet, allowing the ability to see what's going on. Privacy fences can become a potential area of issue as well. Once someone gets behind the fence, they can have all day to work their way into a building with no one seeing them. Next, think about lighting at night. Not only should you have exterior lights keeping the area around you well lit, but make sure you don't inadvertently cause blind spots with the lighting where people can hide.

Another useful tool that many neighbors have been implementing along with the above strategies is the use of cameras. A few neighbors in Bates-Hendricks have offered their services in understanding the different types of cameras and some guidance for installing them. If you're interested in having help, contact Laura at *security@bateshendricks.org*. Remember, the best way to stay safe is to stay visible. Using these simple strategies helps you, your neighbors, and security cameras catch everything happening in the neighborhood. However, if trees, bushes, or tall fences impede your ability to see, then all the people and cameras in the world won't be able to catch a criminal!

In addition to these tips, we can do simple things with our cars too. Keeping valuables in the house rather than the car (or in the trunk when necessary) is a great first step. Also, even though it's winter out, don't leave your car running and unlocked on the street. This becomes a very easy target for criminals since the keys are already in the ignition! Finally, for those with convertibles, keep your doors unlocked. While it's never fun for someone to go through your car, it's even worse for them to do it through the top!

Of course we won't be able to stop everything, but the more common-sense security measures we take, the safer our neighborhood will be!
