#### **5th Annual Bates-Hendricks Street Fest Raises the Bar Once Again**

The 5th Annual Bates-Hendricks Street Fest, which was held on Saturday, September 11, proved to be another record-breaking year in many regards. This year's event attracted well over 1,000 attendees from the Greater Indianapolis area, while also raising a combined total of nearly \$7,000 in Street Fest-related contributions and school items donations! The proceeds from Street Fest are invested directly back into our community via local neighborhood schools, James A Garfield School 31 and SENSE Charter School, as well as the Bates-Hendricks Neighborhood Association's operations towards beautification, programming, and quality-of-life-related purposes.

This year's Street Fest celebration hosted five food vendors; a beer and cider garden featuring Centerpoint Brewing, Ash & Elm Cider, and Taxman Brewing; 35 local craft and goods vendors; 20 community partners; five extremely-talented bands and performers; and a kids activity area sponsored by DATKids. Fest planning committee was honored to start the event by including members of the local Ernie Pyle VFW #1120, who provided a thoughtful reflection of the tragic events that occurred 20 years prior on September 11, 2001 while also honoring former and current members of the U.S. military and public safety officials.

As Street Fest continues to grow in popularity each year, there are many people who volunteer their time and/or generously donate towards our neighborhood's largest annual fundraiser. ## **City Leaf Collection Begins Tuesday, November 9**

The Indianapolis Department of Public Works (Indy DPW) will begin collecting leaves in the neighborhood on Tuesday, November 9. Residents can leave up to 40 bags of leaves for pickup per week on their regularly scheduled collection day during the four-week collection period at no additional cost. Leaf collection will conclude on Tuesday, November 30, 2021.

Leaf collection dates coincide with the time of year when the most leaves are determined to fall from trees.

Here are a few guidelines to follow during leaf collection:

- Place leaves in plastic bags. Paper bags can deteriorate and break apart in wet weather.
- Keep bags at least three feet away from your trash cart for easy pickup.
- Leaf bags should be outside by 7 a.m. on your normal trash day.

While raking leaves, DPW asks that residents clear leaves from storm drain inlets to prevent drainage and flooding problems. Residents are also asked not to rake leaves into the streets, which will cause issues for city street sweepers.

Last year, DPW collected about 5,500 tons of leaves from Marion County residents. As in years past, the collected leaves are taken to the South Side Landfill (*www.ssidelandfill.com*) where they are composted. Residents can pick up the resulting mulch in the spring at no cost.

Outside of the four-week leaf season, residents can place bags of leaves inside their trash cart or take them to the Citizens' Transfer Station (*www.indy.gov/activity/citizens-transfer-station*) on Saturdays. Residents should also remember that burning leaves is illegal in Marion County as it releases harmful particles into our air.
